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THE CLIFFS OF MOHER

The Cliffs of Moher one of Ireland's most visited natural attractions. They stretch for 8km (5miles), as the crow flies, along the Atlantic coast of County Clare in the west of Ireland and reach 214m (702 feet) at their highest point at Knockardakin just north of O'Brien's Tower

At the southern end of the Cliffs of Moher stands Hags Head a natural rocky promontory that resembles a seated woman when viewed from the north. The Cliffs of Moher Visitor Experience is located almost midway along these spectacular cliffs and the site is home to an environmentally friendly visitor centre set into the hillside, O'Brien's Tower – a 19th century viewing tower, and 800 metres of protected cliff side pathways, viewing areas and steps.

Gaze in wonder as you get up close and personal with the magnificent marine life inhabitants. Submerge yourself in the wonderful enchanted underwater world! Come face-to-face with the most fearsome creatures of the sea: sharks. Gain exclusive access to Sandtiger Sharks! Meet the delightful Polar Penguins and gets hands-on experience at the Touch Tank where you can stroke the friendly Rays and even hold a Starfish.

Located in Dingle town in Co Kerry on the Wild Atlantic Way, Dingle Oceanworld Aquarium has the WOW factor! It leaves guests in awe and is yours to be explored and enjoyed all year long.

CHARLES FORT

This star-shaped military fortress was constructed between 1677 and 1682, during the reign of King Charles II, to protect the town and harbour of Kinsale in County Cork. William Robinson, architect of the Royal Hospital in Kilmainham Dublin, and Superintendent of Fortifications, is credited with designing the fort.

As one of the largest military forts in the country, Charles Fort has been associated with some of the most momentous events in Irish history. These include the Williamite War in 1690 and the Irish Civil War of 1922 - 23. Charles Fort remained garrisoned by the British army until 1922. Visitors are advised to wear suitable footwear due to the uneven terrain and children must be accompanied at all times.

THE NATURAL SEA LIFE CENTRE, BRAY

The National Sea Life Centre in Bray, County Wicklow invites visitors to enjoy a journey through the magical world of underwater wildlife without getting wet! Featuring over 24 spectacular displays, the centre offers an unforgettable insight into the marvels of Ireland's freshwater and marine world, as well as the opportunity to view, at close quarters, sea creatures from the world's oceans.

Amazing creatures await you at every turn, from ferocious red bellied piranhas, to cuckoo wrasses who change sex, to seahorses whose males give birth. With over 70 different species on view, the visit culminates at a breath taking tropical shark lagoon, home to shark species such as the black tip reef and leopard varieties.

An interactive, hands-on visit for schools, groups and birthday parties. The helpful and knowledgeable staff will be on hand to answer questions and offer amazing facts about the creatures that you'll see, this is an inspiring visit for all.

DUBLIN NATURAL HISTORY MUSEUM

Just two years before Charles Darwin published his famous work, 'The Origin of Species', the Natural History Museum in Merrion Street was opened to the public for the first time in 1857. Now, as then, it educates and inspires, leaving us feeling small and humbled amidst the vast and wondrous diversity of life on display.

This museum of museums is famous for its Victorian cabinet style, which houses one of the world's finest and fullest collections still to be seen today. Two million species, of which roughly half are insects, live side by side with, appropriately for a natural history museum, decorated and sculptured panels depicting mythological figures. This zoological museum encompasses outstanding examples of wildlife from Ireland and the far corners of the globe, some to be seen today and others long extinct.

CASTLECOMER DISCOVERY PARK, CO KILKENNY

The grounds consist of mixed woodland, on the banks of the River Deen, which was once part of the old Wandesforde Estate. There are numerous activities and attractions including the tree top adventure walk, a 140 metre walk through the beautiful riverside trees 10 metres above ground level. Discover the richness and diversity of the areas local history and science through exploration of the intriguing indoor multi-media experience 'footprints in coal' and engaging outdoor activities.

The woodlands also play host to 6 kilometres of themed woodland walks and a number of wooden sculptures. Twelve sculptures were created within the woodland, each designed to blend in with surroundings and five of the sculptures can be found scattered throughout the woodlands. The park itself is free to visit and perfect for a family day out, with its walking trails, woodland sculptures and many things to see and do throughout the year in our extensive events calendar.

THE AILWEE CAVES

Explore a cave, watch eagles in flight and sample delicious local food products at Aillwee Cave, Ireland's premier show cave in Ballyvaughan County Clare.

Visitors to this popular County Clare attraction are escorted on a 35 minute stroll through caverns, over bridged chasms, beneath unusual rock formations and ending beside a thunderous waterfall. This stunning creation of nature was gradually formed by prehistoric Ice Age melt waters carving paths through this limestone mountain.

Burren Birds of Prey Centre, located at the foot of Aillwee Cave, features the largest display of falcons, harris hawks, owls, American kestrels and white tailed sea eagles in the country. During the breeding season visitors will be able to see young birds of prey being hand reared, learn about falconry as an ancient sport and become more aware of these magnificent indigenous species and the environmental issues involved in their protection and conservation.

PICNIC SPOTS

MALAHIDE CASTLE

Visitors can expect an enhanced visitor experience on entering the castle, including a new Talbot Family Exhibition and interpretation area on the ground floor of the castle, friendly & experienced guides -offering guided tours in different languages. The stunning walled gardens will also be opened to the public for the first time- allowing visitors to ramble around at their own pace!

Within the visitor centre in the courtyard, a new interpretation & exhibition area tells visitors the story of the walled gardens as seen through the eyes of 'Lord Milo Talbot', the creator of the gardens and grounds as seen today. Malahide Castle, set on 250 acres of park land in the pretty seaside town of Malahide,was both a fortress and a private home for nearly 800 years and is an interesting mix of architectural styles.

GLENDALOUGH

The early Christian Monastic site of Glendalough, in County Wicklow, was founded by St Kevin in the 6th century.

Set in a glaciated valley with two lakes, the monastic remains include a superb round tower, stone churches and decorated crosses. There are beautiful walks through the valley and around the lakes. The Visitor Centre, which is also within the National Park, has an interesting exhibition and an audio-visual show. Maps, guides and information on the area's cultural and natural heritage is available to visitors at the Visitor Centre.

NEW BRIDGE HOUSE AND FARM

Newbridge Farm is home to a vast array of animals ranging from the Shetland and Connemara ponies of the paddock, to the piglets, goats and chickens of the farmyard. Access to the farm is through a cobbled courtyard designed by Robert Mack in the late 18th Century.

It is one of the few working farms where children can see pigs, and many other animals, reared in an environment where they can move about freely and express normal patterns of behaviour. Newbridge is very committed to the highest standards of animal welfare and to the preservation of many rare breeds of animals, such as the Gloucester Old Spot, which have all but disappeared due to intensive methods of farming.

Newbridge House and Farm is a terrific day out for all the family, both fun and educational. People all ages enjoy the Farm, from the piglets to Summer the Connemara foal and the gorgeous chicks of the Hatchery. Guided tours are available of the House and delicious treats are baked daily in the Tearooms open daily all year round. There are a range of seasonally themed events throughout the year such as at Halloween and Christmas.

GLENROE FARM

This family run farm opens its gates to visitors from March to October each year. The farm offers close and easy access to a wide selection of animals and fowl, such as horses, deer, goats, sheep, pigs, cattle, donkeys, ducks, geese and hens. Pets' Corner is where young and curious visitors can find their favourite furry animal to hold including rabbits, gerbils, guinea pigs and hamsters.

A 300 year old thatched cottage on the farm has a large collection of farmhouse utensils and offers a nostalgic look at the way our ancestors lived. Children will have lots to do in the fabulous outdoor playground situated on the farm. While you relax in the coffee shop sampling a wide selection of home-made produce. Or bring a packed lunch to enjoy in the indoor picnic area known as The Piggery or outside at one of the many picnic areas throughout the farm.

ARDGILLAN CASTLE

Ardgillan is situated on the elevated coastline between Balbriggan and Skerries and is unique among Dublin's Regional Parks for the magnificent views it enjoys.

The park consists of 194 acres of rolling pastureland, mixed woodland and gardens, overlooking the bay of Drogheda. Ardgillan, meaning high-wooded area, is a sanctuary for many species of mammals and birds.

SALLY GAP
