## Lahinch, Co.Clare

#### Tramore, Co. Waterford

Meaning 'Big Strand', Tramore is one of the most aptly named towns in the region, with its famous 5km golden, sandy beach surrounded by the Atlantic Ocean. Most of the traffic coming to Tramore comes from the Waterford City direction, but the most spectacular approach to this exciting resort is the route from Annestown and the coast road to the elevated western suburbs of the town.

The panorama of Tramore Bay, broken by the peninsula, which carries the promenade and the strand, with the protecting arm of Brownstown Head beyond, is truly magnificent. The town itself is built on steep hills rising up from the beach. The long, rolling waves in Tramore attract swimmers and of course, surfers. Surf lessons and equipment are available locally. Sailing lessons and sea kayaking are also available.

The beach has received the International Blue Flag award for 2014.

## Mullaghmore, Co Sligo

Mullaghmore is a small fishing village and popular holiday centre. The beach is a sandy beach stretching as far as the eye can see. It is safe for swimming, windsurfing and water sports, with sheltered anchorage for small and medium craft at the harbour.

It is also renowned for being a base for licensed angling/passenger boats for charter, sea angling and trips to Inishmurray Island.

This beach has been awarded the Green Coast Award for 2014.

It is ideal for bathing, sailing & walking and has car park and toilet facilities. Dogs are allowed on beach but must be on a lead and under strict supervision of the owner. Owners must clean up after their dogs.

The beach is lifeguarded during the bathing season and more information can be found on the notice board located at the beach.

## FORESTS TO EXPLORE

## Lough Key Forest Park

Comprising some 350 hectares of mixed woodland, a lake and a number of islands, Lough Key in Boyle County Roscommon is one of Ireland's most extensive and picturesque forest parks in Ireland. For the more adventurous, the development also includes the tree canopy trail, Boda Borg Challenge and the adventure play kingdom. Boats are available for hire within the park. Guided tours are available for groups by arrangement.

The visitor centre is the gateway to the parkland and forest at Lough Key. Environmental sustainability and energy efficiency are at the heart of its design and facilities at the centre include a restaurant, gift shop, conference facilities, toilets and baby changing facilities.

#### **Donadea Forest Park**

Donadea Forest Park is situated in northwest Kildare and comprises of approximately 243 hectares of mixed woodland. It is part of the old Aylmer family estate. The last of the Aylmers, Miss Caroline died in 1935 leaving the property to the Church of Ireland, who in turn sold it to the State. There are many historical features including the remains of the castle, walled gardens, church, tower, ice house, boat house and Lime Tree Avenue. There is also a 2.3 hectare lake with ducks and other birds and a wonderful display of water-lilies in the summer. Walled streams form part of the drainage of the park.

There are many different walks through the forest, including the 5km Aylmer loop, the lake walk (wheelchair accessible) and a nature trail with stops. A small café serves light refreshments and is open year round. The park is a designated National Heritage Area.

"We have had many great family days out in Donadea Forest Park. Feeding the ducks on the lake and exploring the grounds of the estate."





The grounds consist of mixed woodland, on the banks of the River Deen, which was once part of the old Wandesforde Estate. There are numerous activities and attractions including the tree top adventure walk, a 140 metre walk through the beautiful riverside trees 10 metres above ground level. Discover the richness and diversity of the areas local history and science through exploration of the intriguing indoor multi-media experience 'footprints in coal' and engaging outdoor activities.

The woodlands also play host to 6 kilometres of themed woodland walks and a number of wooden sculptures. Twelve sculptures were created within the woodland, each designed to blend in with surroundings and five of the sculptures can be found scattered throughout the woodlands. The park itself is free to visit and perfect for a family day out, with its walking trails, woodland sculptures and many things to see and do throughout the year.

## The Fairy Forest in Corkagh Park Dublin

Corkagh Park is located near the Naas road stretching towards Clondalkin, in County Dublin. Opened to the public in 1986, it consists of 120 hectares and was formerly part of Corkagh Demense. The Fairy Forest is located near the Pet Farm, the Rose Garden, the fishing lakes and the Arboretum will increase the level of free fun young families can have in this award winning park before they get to the playground!

Corkagh Playground is located in the heart of Corkagh Park, bordering a woodland and stream, the setting is very picturesque and people of all ages visit it for play and picnics. This is a large playground providing play opportunities for both junior (two-six years) and senior (six-twelve years) age groups. Additionally Corkagh Pet Farm is located near the visitor centre and rose garden and is home to an aviary and animal enclosure for housing a range of farm animals and pets.

## Fairy Trail in Parknasilla
